Intertextuality, the web of allusions, quotations, parallels, and borrowings that link texts across traditions, languages, and centuries, is central to the study of many ancient and classical corpora. The emergence of computational tools offers new and powerful ways to detect, analyze, and visualize these textual relationships at scale. Scholars working on Hebrew, Sanskrit, Greek, and other ancient textual traditions are developing a growing range of algorithms, datasets, and digital resources directed at this challenge.

This half-day symposium brings together a cross-disciplinary group of researchers to take stock of current computational approaches to intertextuality. The goal is to share methods and findings, learn what each group is building and planning, discuss the available tools and resources, and identify shared problems and opportunities for collaboration.
